My efforts as Director of the L-MAS program focused on promoting the undergraduate minor and developing a variety of programs intended to support the growth of Latina/o/x film, television, journalism, and advertising, as well as student media makers, journalists and advertising professionals, and the production of Latina/o/x media studies scholarship. I coordinated student events, film screenings, networking opportunities, and the signature L-MAS Speaker Series, which brought prominent Latina/o/x industry professionals to campus both virtually, and in-person. I moderated several of the conversations with guest filmmakers who shared their experiences and knowledge with the UT community. I oversaw the Latinx Media Studies Research Group, which provided a supportive environment for faculty and students across campus to create community and provide feedback on works-in-progress related to Latin American and US Latinx subjects. I also coordinated and served as a judge for the annual L-MAS Student Awards for outstanding graduate and undergraduate student media production, screenwriting, and scholarship focused on Latinx subjects.

Much of the work to maintain the program was administrative in nature. I hired and trained staff, created annual performance review procedures, and supervised staff's daily activities. I developed program infrastructure and processes to maximize program efficiency, and I was responsible for the planning and maintenance of annual budgets. I maintained the L-MAS website and social media accounts and trained staff to do the same. We worked together to increase our social media footprint over the course of three years and in the absence of qualified accounting staff, I often attended to a variety of purchasing and accounting tasks via the UT accounting system, DEFINE. I worked with the Moody Development Team and an independent consultant to identify and cultivate potential donors and funding bodies. I built collaborative relationships with various programs, organizations, and individuals across the Moody College, the UT campus and beyond. I also spearheaded fundraising efforts such as the annual 40 for Forty fundraising campaign, which raised monies from individual donors during my first year as Acting Director of the program.

I also suggested strategies to facilitate program growth and secure additional funding.

I took on a new position to spearhead the Community Media initiative that AFS created when they secured a contract to operate the City of Austin's community media center, Austin Public. I managed the contract with the City of Austin and served as the principle liaison to city officials. I was responsible for hiring and supervising a team of management, administrative, and teaching staff for adult education programs that empower underrepresented communities and facilitate creative expression, freedom of speech, and diversification of the media landscape. I developed and implemented Policies and Procedures for staff and members, as well as evaluation tools to assess the Community Media program's impact. I also developed and managed the Community Media Department's annual budget and wrote/secured multiple grants for youth film education programs.

Programming activities included the development and implementation of new education and outreach programs (e.g.: Spanish-language campaigns, need-based scholarships, PSA program for non-profits, panels and course offerings) to increase awareness of Austin Public's programs. I taught a monthly Media Policy workshop (required of all new producers at the facility) about representations and warranties that govern what content can be submitted for programming on public access television.
